Dear Honorable Judge Shubb:


My name is Wael M. Abouelmaaty and I am currently the Cairo GM for Valco Egypt, a French multinational with a local office in Egypt. I know Dr. Amr Mohsen very well on the business and personal sides since I lived in the United States of America between the years 1994 & 2003. On the business side; I worked at Aptix Corp in 1998 as an intern from San Jose State University and between Jan. 1999 & Jan 2001 as a full time employee of Aptix. During this period Dr. Mohsen was the CEO & board Chairman of Aptix. Dr. Mohsen, used to hold company wide meetings every Friday morning to discuss with us the business status. He was an extremely knowledgeable person on the technical side and a very talented sales individual. I was always amazed by the brightness of Dr. Mohsen and how he was able to combine both deep understanding of the technicality of this business while at the same time drive the sales and operations of Aptix. I remember all the sales team always depending on Dr. Mohsen to seal any deal and look also for him whenever we have a customer complaint. On the personal side, and as an Egyptian who came to the United States to get an engineering degree in Computer Science and get professional experience, I knew Dr. Mohsen from the Egyptian community in the bay area. Dr. Mohsen was a leader in this community. All Egyptian youth and grown ups used to go to him for advice and for help when needed. He never refused to help any one in our community and always cheered us when we had any problem. He helped me several times with school tuition and even with his extremely valuable time when I needed technical help at school. He also used to cheer me up when I was feeling home sick. Not only that he used to help me or the Egyptian community but every one who knew Dr. Mohsen can testify the same. At Aptix for example, the board decided two times to close the company since there was no cash to pay for employees but Dr. Mohsen used to take it upon his shoulder to keep the company running and pay from his own pocket the employees salaries & when I asked him why pay from his own pocket he used to reply, 'this is my duty'.

Dr. Mohsen is really a great. genius. good hearted man . I am really hoping to see Dr. Mohsen freed soon.

My name is Akram Chowdry, resident of Atherton, California. I have lived in California for 35 years, coming to the US for graduate school (Ph.D. from UC Berkeley). Upon graduating, I was a professor for few years before moving into private industry where I founded several high technology firms. I am currently a General Partner at Hi-Tech Venture Capital Fund, located in Menlo Park, California.

I met Amr Mohsen about six years ago. As he was the CEO of Aptix, a high technology firm, our paths would cross at industry related functions or through mutual business acquaintances. In the last three years, I got to know Amr a little better as he and I were both part of a group of businessmen exploring a potential business opportunity. Amr's involvement in this business opportunity was cut short with his arrest.

After reading of Amr's actions that lead to his arrest and conviction, I was in complete shock. The Amr I knew was a courteous, soft-spoken, polite businessman. That this same individual could act so dishonorably and immorally was hard to comprehend. But clearly, Amr's actions were grievously illegal and our justice system is doing the right thing by holding him accountable for his actions. Having said that, I don't think Amr is incorrigible or beyond help. I don't believe Amr started out intending to break the law. It's more likely he made a series of stupid mistakes and misjudgments, each one making his situation worse. I respectfully ask the court to consider this as a decision on his sentence is made. In my view, Amr's education, work experience and lessons learned in jail will allow him to contribute to our society. Any leniency in terms of time in jail, could be worthwhile investment in the community service.
